At our next Delta Kappa Gamma meeting on Wednesday, March 30th, we will once again have the opportunity to share a creative experience with each other and learn a new skill: painting pottery at [Katie's Clay Studio](#) on Route 8 in Allison Park! We will begin the evening with our business meeting and a brown-bag supper that you bring, and then we'll begin our masterpiece!

As Katie explained to me, she has over 200 items for selection, and this project is good for all art abilities. We will each pay individually that evening for the items(s) that we would like to paint. The prices range from \$7 for a small piece to \$75 for a large platter. We will pay for the cost of the item and an additional charge to fire the finished piece. The normal cost to fire an item is \$7, but since we are a group, Katie reduced the price to \$3.50 per piece. The cost of the selected item or items, plus the \$3.50 fee to fire each item needs to total a minimum of \$16.50 per person. We can pay with cash or credit card that evening, and we need a minimum of 10 participants. As always, guests are welcome, so bring along a friend or two who may enjoy the experience (and who may be interested in learning about our chapter)!

Feel free to bring your preference for your own supper and beverage, or you may like to share with friends! We are welcome to bring an adult beverage, but we would also need to bring along our own cups, corkscrew, etc.

Even though there is no pre-payment or meal choice for this meeting, it is important to RSVP, so that Katie will know how many participants to expect.

We hope that you'll be able to join us for an evening of fun, food, and friendship as we create our works of art!
